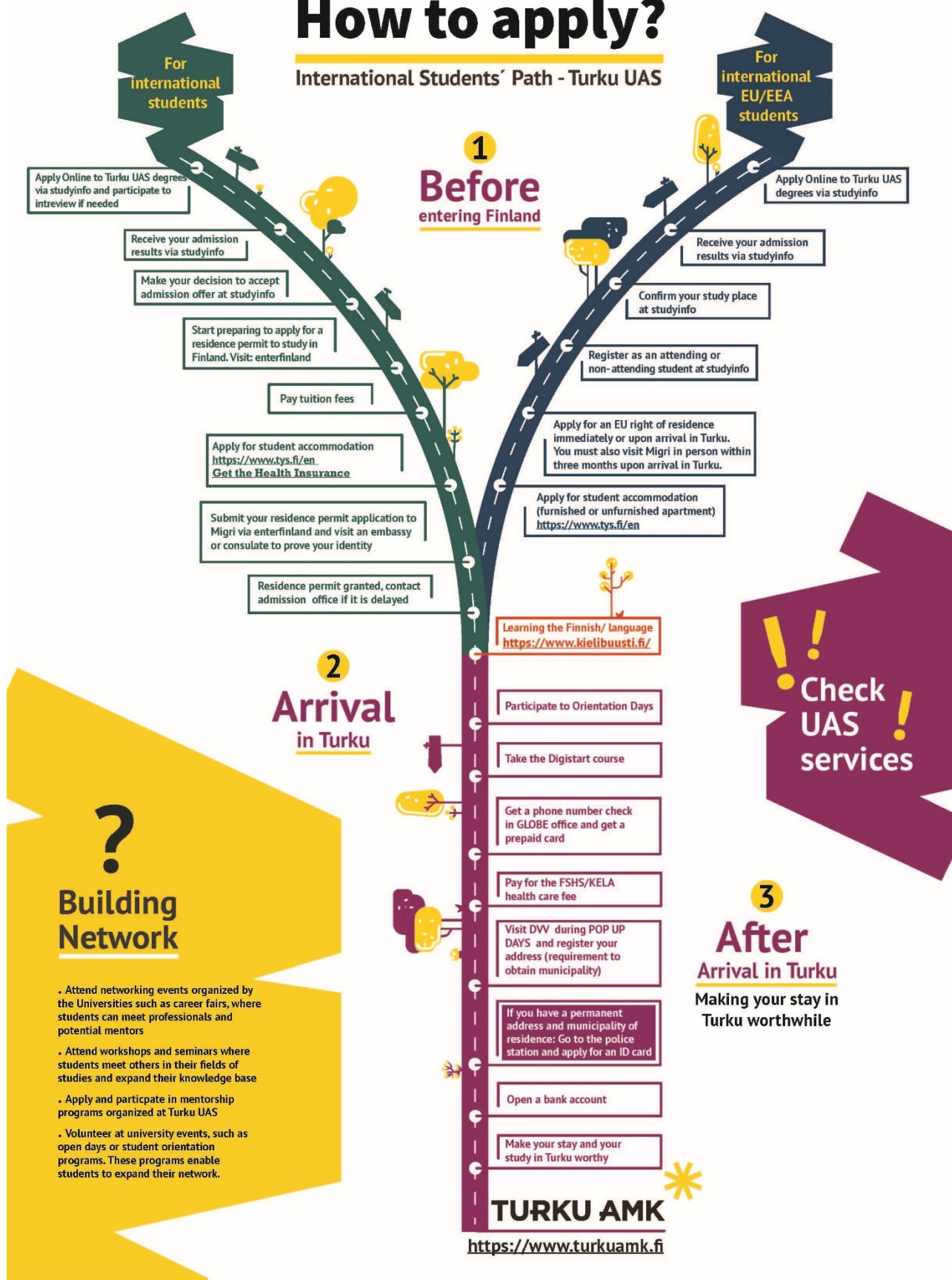
You might already be familiar with this chart, but now and then it's good to take a moment to reflect on where you are on your journey with Turku UAS.

Cost of Living

In Finland, higher education is world-renowned and publicly funded, which means studying is free for EU/EEA students. However, if you are a non-EU/EEA student, tuition fees apply for English-taught degree programmes. At Turku UAS, the annual tuition fee for degree programmes is 12,000 euros starting from 2026.

In addition to tuition, you should also consider your living expenses, which start from 800 euros per month, depending on your lifestyle and housing choices. This includes rent, food, transport, and personal spending. Fortunately, Finland offers various student discounts on meals, transportation, and cultural events to help manage your budget.

If eligible, you can also apply for scholarships that can reduce your tuition fees significantly. Turku UAS provides scholarships based on Finnish language proficiency.

Meal subsidy

If you are in higher education, you are eligible for a once-a-day discounted meal at participating student restaurants. The subsidy is deducted from the price of the meal at the student restaurant. You pay the discounted price of around 3 euros per meal (please check the portions you are allowed to consume).

You can qualify even if you are not a Finnish citizen. If you are attending a higher education institution in Finland as an exchange student, you qualify for the meal subsidy for the duration of your exchange.

Scholarships

Turku University of Applied Sciences offers a scholarship programme to support international degree students in developing their Finnish language skills and integrating into Finnish society. Scholarships are awarded based on the results of the National Certificate of Language Proficiency in Finnish, also known as the YKI test.

This programme applies to students whose right to study began in 2021 or later (students who applied in autumn 2020 or later).

Scholarship Amounts

The amount of the scholarship depends on the tuition fee paid in the previous academic year:

- 4,000 euros if the student has paid 12,000 euros
- 2,000 euros if the student has paid 6,000 euros

The scholarship can be granted once per academic year and is refunded in connection with the next tuition fee payment.

Overalls: What is the deal?

One of the first things you might notice during student events in Turku is the bright, colorful overalls worn by students. These overalls aren't just fun outfits – they're an important part of Finnish student culture and a symbol of community, belonging, and student identity.

Each field of study has its own color, so you can easily recognize fellow students from your own or other degree programmes. Overalls are worn during parties, events, and student gatherings throughout the year – especially during Vappu (May Day), one of Finland's biggest student celebrations.

Students personalize their overalls by decorating them with badges (called haalarimerkit), which you collect from events, student organizations, or trade with friends. Every badge tells a story and makes your overalls truly unique!

You can usually order your overalls through your student association once the academic year begins. Keep an eye out for announcements and info sessions from your student union or tutors.

And here's a tip: if you ever see our Rector Vesa Taatila in the corridor, don't hesitate to say hello! You can even ask him for the most wanted badge at Turku UAS: the legendary "Rector Doesn't Bite" badge. So, don't be shy – put on your overalls, start collecting those badges, and enjoy being part of this fun and meaningful tradition in the Turku student community!

Your Responsibilities as a Student

Studying in Finland means embracing independence and responsibility. As a student at Turku UAS, you're expected to manage your time, attend classes, participate actively, and communicate proactively with your teachers. Here's what that means in practice:

Participate Actively and Regularly

You are expected to attend and participate in all mandatory classes, workshops, and group assignments. Learning at Turku UAS is based on collaboration and real-life projects, so being present and engaged is essential for your success and for the learning of your peers. Please be aware that the Finnish Immigration Service - Migri is checking your study progress to monitor if you can maintain your student residence permit.

Manage Your Time and Progress

Plan your studies carefully and keep track of your progress in your personal study plan (PSP). Staying organized will help you meet deadlines, manage workloads, and graduate on time. If you encounter any obstacles, don't wait—reach out to your teachers or study counsellor. Please note that Migri is following your progress in order to maintain your residence permit, you need to gain 45 credits per academic year ([Extended permit for studies](#)).

Communicate Proactively

Keep in touch with your teachers and tutors. If you're unable to attend a class, fall behind, or need help, let someone know. Turku UAS staff are here to support you, but they can't help if they don't know what's going on.

Take Responsibility for Learning

Higher education in Finland emphasizes independent thinking and initiative. You are expected to seek information, complete assignments on time, and follow the instructions given by teachers. Take ownership of your learning experience, it's part of your professional development.

Respect Others and Contribute to a Positive Study Environment

At Turku UAS, we value diversity and inclusion. Respect the opinions, backgrounds, and rights of others. Everyone should feel safe and supported in the learning community.

Follow Ethical Guidelines

All students must follow good scientific practices and academic integrity. This means completing your own work, citing sources correctly, and avoiding plagiarism. Violations are taken seriously and may lead to disciplinary action.

Keep Your Information Up to Date

Update your contact details in Peppi – the student information system and other student systems to ensure you receive all relevant communication regarding your studies.

Education System in Finland

Finland is internationally recognized for its high-quality education system, which consistently ranks among the top in the world. Known for its emphasis on equality, accessibility, and lifelong learning, Finland's approach to education is student-centered, innovative, and deeply rooted in trust between educators and learners.

After comprehensive basic education (grades 1–9), students can choose between general upper secondary education or vocational education, both of which provide pathways to higher education. Finnish universities and universities of applied sciences (UAS) form the two main branches of higher education.

At universities of applied sciences like Turku UAS, the focus is on practical, career-oriented education. Degree programmes combine theory with hands-on learning, real-world projects, and internships in collaboration with local companies. This ensures that graduates are well-prepared for the demands of working life.

Key features of the Finnish higher education system:

- Student-centered learning: Independent thinking, teamwork, and active participation are at the heart of Finnish education.
- Global recognition: Finland is frequently ranked among the best countries in the world for education quality (e.g., PISA, World Economic Forum reports).
- Flat hierarchy: Teachers and students interact openly, often on a first-name basis, creating a relaxed and respectful atmosphere where the teacher still has the responsibility for education and grading.
- Strong support systems: Students receive comprehensive support, including academic advising, career services, and well-being resources.

Studying in Finland means becoming part of a globally respected education system that values collaboration, curiosity, and competence.

Moving to Finland

Starting a new chapter in a new country is an exciting journey—and like all journeys, it goes more smoothly when you're well prepared. Below you'll find everything you need to know before arriving in Finland, what to expect when you land, and the key steps to take after you settle in. From securing housing and gathering the necessary documents to making sure your study equipment meets the requirements, this section will teach you the essentials to ensure a smooth transition.

Before Arriving

Before you pack your bags, make sure to go through this essential checklist:

Residence Permit for Non-EU/EEA Students and D VISA

If you are not a citizen of an EU/EEA country, you must apply for a residence permit for studies before coming to Finland. This process is managed by the Finnish Immigration Service (Migri) and Turku UAS **cannot** expedite the process.

You can begin your application online through the [Enter Finland portal](#), but you will still need to visit a Finnish embassy or consulate in person in your home- or nearby- country for biometric identification (such as fingerprints and photo).

To apply for a residence permit, you must:

- Have a valid health insurance policy that meets Finnish requirements
- Show proof of sufficient funds, currently at least 800 euros per month for the duration of your studies
- Be accepted to a degree programme in Finland and have paid the required tuition fees.

Once you receive your residence permit, you do not need a separate visa to enter the Schengen area, which includes most EU countries.

We recommend starting this process as soon as you know about your acceptance: it can take several months. Make sure to carefully check the documents you send with your application and contact the authorities directly if you are uncertain. Any errors can lengthen the process.

You can find instructions on how to apply for a residence permit for studying on the website of the Finnish Immigration Service.

Income Requirement for Student Residence Permit

To apply for a student residence permit in Finland, you must prove that you have sufficient funds to support yourself.

- minimum requirement: **€800/month (€9,600/year)**
- funds must be **accessible to you** (in your own bank account)
- applies to both **new permits and extensions**.

Please note that if you are coming to Finland with your family, your family members must apply for residence permits as well. Read more about the residence permits for [student's family members](#) on the website of the Finnish Immigration Service. Recently there have been delays with the processing times for residence permits of family members from some countries, due to the high volume of applications.

With a D visa, you can enter Finland immediately without having to wait for the residence permit card. You can apply for a D visa in Enter Finland at the same time as you apply for a residence permit. Read more about [D visa](#) on the website of Finnish Immigration Service.



[Please answer this survey](#) to inform us about the status of your residence permit and arriving in Finland. You can answer the survey again if the status changes later.

EU/EEA Registration

If you are a citizen of an EU member state, a Nordic country, Liechtenstein or Switzerland, you do not need a residence permit to stay in Finland. However, you do need to register your right of residence and apply for EU registration. EU/EEA students must register their [right of residence](#) in Finland after arrival if they stay longer than 3 months.

Accommodation

Please note that it is your own responsibility to arrange accommodation before arriving. Turku UAS **does not have** its own accommodation to offer.

Turku

[TYS \(Turku Student Village Foundation\)](#) offers affordable student housing close to campuses and the city center.

Due to high demand, housing is not guaranteed, so we strongly recommend that you apply as early as possible—ideally three months before your intended move-in date. Applications are free of charge and can be submitted through the TYS website.

If you're not offered an apartment through TYS, don't worry, there are alternative options available through private housing providers, rental platforms, and social media housing groups.

Insurance and Health Care

The [Finnish Student Health Service \(FSHS\)](#) provides student health services for degree students. However, the FSHS only provides basic health care services, which do not include urgent medical care or secondary health care in hospitals. Turku UAS does not provide health insurance for international degree students, so please make sure you have valid health insurance during your studies.

Students from other EU or EEA countries

You must provide a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) when accessing FSHS services. The FSHS will be required by law to ask to see a European Health Insurance Card to identify students who are covered by state-provided health insurance from a country other than Finland. The card must be obtained before coming to Finland. Students from the UK may provide a Global Health Insurance Card (GHIC).

If you are a non-EU/EEA citizen, make sure you have valid health insurance that covers both accidents and illness. Turku UAS has insurance against injuries during studies, but it does not cover leisure time accidents or eventual illness during your stay. You are also required to have health insurance before applying for a residence permit for studies. Please read more about the requirements of the insurance.

Kela Benefits and Health Coverage for International Students

Kela (The Social Insurance Institution of Finland) provides social security benefits to people living in Finland, including healthcare access, family support, and financial assistance. However, eligibility for international students depends on your country of origin, length of stay, and residence status. Below is an overview of the current guidelines:

Students from the EU/EEA, Switzerland, UK

You usually cannot receive Kela benefits (e.g., housing support, financial aid). With a valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC), you are entitled to medically necessary treatment in Finland at local rates. You are not required to pay the FSHS healthcare fee, but:

- You can use FSHS (Finnish Student Health Services) if you're pursuing a full degree in Finland.
- Exchange students cannot use FSHS services.
- Family Members: Family members typically are not eligible unless their stay is considered permanent. This may change if the student studies in Finland long-term.

Students from Outside the EU/EEA

If your degree programme lasts at least two years, your stay may be considered permanent, making you eligible for:

- Parental allowance
- Sickness allowance
- Reimbursement of medical expenses
- A Kela card and a Finnish EHIC

However, you are not eligible for:

- General housing allowance
- Student financial aid or housing supplement
- The maternity package

You must:

- Pay the healthcare fee to Kela each semester

You can use FSHS services (if you're a degree student)

Exchange students are not required to pay the fee and cannot use FSHS.

Family Members of Non-EU Students

Family members may qualify for Kela benefits, even if the student does not.

If the family members are considered permanent residents, they may access:

- General housing allowance
- Child benefits
- Health insurance benefits

Note: If a family member receives housing allowance, the student is not counted in the household size, which may reduce the amount of the benefit.

Students or family members with a temporary residence permit (Type B) are not eligible for unemployment assistance (labour market subsidy).

Residence Permits and Kela

- You must have a valid residence permit or legal right to reside in Finland to access most Kela benefits.
- Your income (for residence permit purposes) is assessed by Migri, not Kela.
- Kela automatically receives residence permit updates from Migri.

Health documents for degree students

Degree students should ensure they bring any required vaccination or health records.

Instructions for students in fields other than social and health care:

- Please note that you need to bring your Vaccination certificate (in English) including information on previous vaccination (how many doses, date, month, year).

Bring a Laptop

Most coursework, projects, and communication at Turku UAS rely on digital platforms, so having your own laptop is essential.

Relocating with Family

Relocating to a new country with your family, especially with children, can feel overwhelming. At Turku UAS you can contact **MOI Services**, we provide support offering guidance on topics such as residence permits, childcare, schooling, housing, and healthcare.

Residence Permits for Children

If your child is under 18 and moving with you to Finland, they will need a residence permit. Applications are processed by the [Finnish Immigration Services \(Migri\)](#). Please note, that if you are coming to Finland with your family, all your family members must apply for residence permits as well. Recently there have been delays with the processing times for residence permits of family members from some countries, due to the high volume of applications.

Please note: You must demonstrate sufficient financial resources for your family's stay in Finland

Education

In Finland, all children have the right to free basic education. This includes:

- Early childhood education and care
- Pre-primary education (starting at age 6)
- Comprehensive school (ages 7–16)
- Upper secondary education, which is compulsory until the age of 18

Children who do not speak Finnish will usually be placed in preparatory education (abbreviation in Finnish: [VALMO](#)) first. Preparatory education is meant for children whose native languages are not Finnish or Swedish and prepares them for basic education. The students learn Finnish and other skills for approximately a year before transferring to regular classes.

Education in Turku

The City of Turku provides detailed information in English about enrolling your child in [daycare](#) or [basic education](#), as well as [upper secondary school and vocational basic education](#). It is also possible to have education in other languages such as [English](#) or [Swedish](#).

Housing for Families

Where you live in Turku can impact which daycare or school your child will attend. It's important to start looking for accommodation early, especially if you are applying for a family apartment. While TYS (Turku Student Village Foundation) offers some family housing, demand is high. We recommend exploring other private housing platforms as well (please refer to previous Housing session).

Registering with DVV (Digital and Population Data Services Agency)

After arriving in Finland, both you and your family members must register with DVV. This ensures that your child receives a Finnish personal identity code, which is required for accessing many public services. Please note:

- Children are not automatically registered with the student's DVV registration.
- You should book an appointment for your child's registration while you, as a student, should visit the DVV POP UP Days. Please visit the previous DVV session for more information.

Getting a criminal records extract

Only for students of Social Services, Early Childhood Education: All students working, doing a practical training or internship with children or minors in Finland, must show a criminal records extract in English before starting their first working / internships experience. Therefore, we strongly recommend that you get such a document from the authorities in your home country before arriving to Finland. As a student, it is your responsibility to make sure you have the required criminal records' extract before starting your first practical training/internship. Turku UAS is not responsible if the starting of your practical training/internship is delayed or cancelled because of a missing document. You can find more information about what kind of information should be provided in your extract below.

Information provided in the extract:

Your employer and certain authorities will ask for the criminal history extract, if your job or practical training/internship involves working with children on a permanent and substantial basis. Your criminal records extract should only include criminal record information that is thought to have special significance to your work with children.

Therefore, the extract should contain information about judgments for the following offenses:

Your extract should also include information about any fines that have been sentenced for offences against children or sex offences, or for similar offences sentenced. Finally, your extract should include information about any bans on working with or otherwise dealing with children.

If you are not guilty of any of the offences given above, your criminal records extract should include a note of this. So, the criminal records extract should not show any information other than the offences listed above, even if there are other entries in the record.

Getting Around Turku

The Turku local public transport system ([Föli](#)) is reliable and student-friendly. You can use the same travel card for buses, bikes, and even ferries. Once you have your Student Card you can also have the student discounts. If you live in Turku, the easiest way to reach the campus is on foot. If you live outside Turku, you can check local bus routes on Föli or travel by train (Kupittaa Station is 200 meters from the campus).

GLOBE Office

Globe Office is Turku UAS' international support hub and student office services. Here, you can ask questions, get help with paperwork, meet other international students, and receive support for soft-landing and residence permit issues. The office is located in the Edu City building; 1st floor in the service corridor behind the info desk. Globe is open every day from 24th of August till 14th of September from 11:30- 14:30. From the 15th of September every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 11:30-14:30 for the international and student office services. Every Monday from 9.30 until 11.30 for soft-landing, integration and residence permit issues. You don't need an appointment to visit Globe, however if you need to meet a specific employee it is better to contact them in advance.

Late Arrival

We recommend you arrive in good time to have time to settle down before the start of your studies. The obligatory orientation gives you a good start to your studies. If you cannot attend the orientation days in person you can participate online on Zoom (the link will be provided later on) but please be aware that you won't receive your student credential and cards, meet your student tutor, and will miss a lot of information outside the streaming.

The final day to arrive for:

- Engineering & Business degree programmes (Bachelor's): **14 September 2026**
- ICT and Industrial Engineering: **14 September 2026**
- Master's degree programmes (MBA): **30 September 2026**
- Early Childhood Education: **30 September 2026**

Postponing the start of the studies

If you miss the final day to arrive due to a delay in receiving the residence permit decision, please inform admissions@turkuamk.fi that you will start your studies in the next intake (Spring 2027 or Autumn 2027 depending on your studies). Provide a proof of delay, for example the certificate of a pending application from Enter Finland showing the status of your residence permit application.

After Arrival

Orientation Days

Orientation Days are the start of your official journey at Turku UAS. The days are mandatory and part of your curricula. Join the Orientation Days to receive the important information to start your studies, get your student credentials and student card, meet fellow students, explore your new campus, and learn about practical tools for succeeding in your studies. Digistart and Student Card

You'll receive instructions during orientation on how to activate your Turku UAS username and email account. This gives you access to essential systems like: Student Card, Peppi (study management), Itslearning (learning platform), Turku UAS student email and intranet. Don't delay activating—these tools are vital to your studies.

Student Card

There are various discounts available for students, most of which require a student card.

There are different types of student cards:

- Turku University of Applied Sciences offers all its students a free student card in the Tuudo mobile app.

Student cards are also available for open UAS path students, but path students are not entitled to all the same student discounts as degree students.

Discounts on public transport

As a degree student, you can get a student discount on tickets for Föli (local traffic), Matkahuolto (long-distance bus services), and VR (long-distance railway services), for example.

Digistart

Start your studies by completing your first ECTS credits as a student at Turku University of Applied Sciences! With the Digistart course, you will get acquainted with studying at Turku UAS even before you start your studies. You will learn how we study, what tools we use and where you can get support. You can participate in the course after you have activated your Turku UAS user ID.

The DigiStart course will start on 5 August 2026. If you can't register your Turku UAS user ID before starting the studies, you can take the course later.

Here's how to get on the course:

- Log in to [Itslearning](#)
- Select 'Login with HAKA' and use the Turku UAS user ID you received during registration.
- Select 'Courses' in the home screen, then 'Digistart Autumn 2026'. Follow the instructions to proceed with the course. The Digistart course is available in Finnish and English. The language of the course depends on the teaching language of the degree programme.
- If you don't see the Digistart course in Itslearning front page, you can also join the course yourself. In itslearning, select Courses > All courses > Find more courses > Site course catalogue and join the Digistart course.

Get a Finnish Phone Number

A local phone number is often required for online banking, student services, and receiving messages from Finnish institutions. In the Globe office we have some prepaid SIM cards, or you can get a prepaid SIM at the airport from R-Kioski or from stores like Elisa, DNA, or Telia.

Pay the FSHS/Kela Fees

You must pay the student healthcare fee if you have registered as attending at a Finnish university or university of applied sciences and you are completing a degree there.

You must pay the fee even if you do not get student financial aid or if you use occupational or other health services instead of the FSHS. The healthcare fee is not the same as a per-visit charge or charge for services used but is intended to finance the student's health services in general.

You do **not** have to pay the healthcare fee [if you have social security coverage in another EU or EEA country, Switzerland, Great Britain or Northern Ireland](#). In this case, you can use the services of the FSHS even if you do not pay the healthcare fee.

No bill is sent for the fee: Remember to pay the healthcare fee to Kela for both the spring semester and the autumn semester. You are not billed for the fee but are expected to pay it on your own initiative via the OmaKela e-service (available in Finnish and Swedish). Kela will remind you to pay the fee with a letter in OmaKela or by mail about three weeks before the due date for payment.

Due dates for the student healthcare fee:

- The due date for the fee for the spring semester is 15 March if you register as attending by 31 January.
- If you register as attending for the spring semester on or after 1 February, the due date is 31 July.
- The due date for the fee for the autumn term is 15 November if you register as attending by 30 September.
- If you register as attending for the autumn semester on or after 1 October, the due date is 31 December.

DVV Registration

The Digital and Population Data Services Agency (DVV) maintains Finland's Population Information System. If you're a foreign student moving to Finland, you will need to register your personal data with DVV and apply for a Finnish personal identity code—a number essential for banking, healthcare, housing, and university services.

If you've already received a personal identity code (e.g. through Migri with your residence permit), you still need to visit the DVV to register your address, family relations, and possibly your municipality of residence (if you meet the conditions). These steps are mandatory for long-term residents and important for accessing public services.

To make registration easier for new students, DVV organizes dedicated pop-up registration days in Turku at the beginning of each semester. These are only for students, and no separate appointment is needed. If you try to book a regular appointment during these dates, your booking will be cancelled. DVV does not serve family members during pop-in student registration events.

If you are arriving in Finland together with your family, you must book an appointment in advance for both yourself and each family member via the DVV online booking system. For larger families, book at least two consecutive time slots. If your family is arriving later, you can attend a pop-in session by yourself, and your family can book their own appointments after arriving in Finland.

Finnish ID Card

If you are planning to stay in Finland for a longer period—such as for the full duration of your degree—it may be useful to apply for a Finnish identity card. This card serves as official proof of identity in everyday situations and can be more convenient than carrying your passport. In addition, the identity card is often required to obtain full banking credentials (strong electronic authentication), which may not be possible with a residence permit card alone.

Please note: A residence permit card is not a valid identity card in Finland.

How to Apply for a Finnish Identity Card

You can apply for a Finnish identity card through the Finnish Police. The process generally includes the following steps:

- Register your municipality of residence with the Digital and Population Data Services Agency (DVV).
- Have your passport photo taken at a photo service that can electronically transfer the photo directly to the Police system (official photographers).
- Book an appointment at a local police station or visit without an appointment (queuing is possible but may involve longer waiting times).
- Attend your appointment, submit the application, pay the required processing fee, and choose a delivery method for your card.
- Pick up your identity card from the police station or a designated delivery point such as an R-Kioski (convenience store).

Please note that applying for a Finnish identity card involves costs, including:

- A fee for the electronic passport photo
- A separate application fee paid to the Police

Open a Finnish Bank Account

Many everyday services—such as paying rent, receiving a scholarship or salary, and using mobile banking—will be easier with a local bank account. However, be aware that opening an account can take time, so it's best to begin the process early.

To open an account, you must first:

- Receive your Finnish personal identity code
- Register your municipality of residence with the Digital and Population Data Services Agency (DVV)

These are essential before any bank can serve you.

Banks in Finland operate by appointment. Each bank may have slightly different procedures, so always check their requirements in advance.

When you attend your appointment, be sure to bring:

- A valid passport or national ID card
- Your Finnish personal identity code
- Residence permit card or proof of legal stay in Finland
- Proof of student status (Your student card in Tuudo, or acceptance letter).

Some banks may ask for additional details about your financial situation, including:

- Your main source of income (e.g., scholarship, family support)
- How often and what types of payments you expect to receive or make
- Whether you intend to use the bank as your main financial institution
- Whether you or your family members are considered Politically Exposed Persons (PEPs)

Even though banks may ask for a Finnish ID card issued by the police, it is not legally required to open a basic bank account. The Finnish Financial Supervisory Authority (FIN-FSA) states that banks must provide basic banking services—including online access—to those who have a legal residence and a personal identity code. If needed, you can politely refer to this regulation during your appointment.

Learning Finnish

At Turku UAS, you can study Finnish as a second language at different language skill levels (A1 – B2). Read more about the language skill levels in [Finnish](#) or [English](#).

Finnish as a Second Language, or S2 studies, are offered to all students of Turku UAS regardless of the field of study and whether you are completing a bachelor's or master's degree, path studies or another study module of Open Studies.

A Finnish conversation time where Finnish students support the learning of the language it is usually organized at Turku UAS. Combining Studies and Work

Working, Studying, and Taxation in Finland

While studying in Finland, many international students explore part-time work opportunities to gain experience or support their living costs. However, it's important to understand the rules surrounding taxation and financial aid, especially as a foreign student.

Academic Studies and Financial Aid

If you have arrived in Finland to pursue a degree, your primary purpose is to study. As such, you are generally not entitled to Finnish student financial aid (opintotuki) unless you meet specific residency criteria. If you do receive financial aid from Finland (e.g. via Kela), it is considered taxable income and must be reported.

In general, if you are a foreign student or trainee, Finland does not collect tax on the income you receive from other countries. The reason for this is related to the provisions of international tax treaties between Finland and other countries. If, however, you are paid wages or salaries by a Finnish employer, that income will be subject to Finnish taxes.

Working and Paying Taxes

If you plan to work in Finland during your studies, you must obtain a tax card (verokortti) from the Finnish Tax Administration (Verohallinto). To get a tax card, visit a tax office with the following documents:

- Passport
- Student ID or certificate of student status

Once you receive your tax card, you must give it to your employer before starting work. Finnish employers are required by law to:

- Withhold tax at the rate indicated on your tax card

- Possibly deduct social security contributions from your salary

Reminder About Working Limits

Even though your residence permit may allow part-time work, your studies should remain your main priority. It is not realistic to rely solely on part-time work to cover your living expenses, especially without Finnish language skills. Finding a job—particularly without prior experience or fluency in Finnish—can be challenging and is not guaranteed.

Typical part-time jobs include:

- Cleaning
- Food delivery or courier services
- Restaurant work (waitstaff, kitchen assistant)

Wages for student jobs usually range between 7 and 13 euros per hour. Freelancers and entrepreneurs are responsible for managing their own tax reporting and payments. Even in this case you may work up to 30 hours per week.

Before taking on a job, make sure you understand your tax responsibilities and balance your work with your academic progress.

Importance of Unions and Unemployment Funds

In Finland, trade unions and unemployment funds (työttömyyskassat) play an essential role in protecting workers' rights and providing financial security. Trade unions support you with legal advice, workplace issues, fair pay, and safe working conditions. If you become a union member, you often get access to professional networks, training opportunities, and discounts.

Separately or through the union, you can also join an unemployment fund, which may entitle you to income-based unemployment benefits if you lose your job, something not automatically available to all residents. This is especially important if you plan to stay in Finland after graduation and work. While membership is not mandatory, many professionals and students find it helpful for peace of mind and career development. It's recommended to join early if you're working part-time during studies or plan to start your career in Finland.

Integration, Support and Belonging

Moving to a new country and starting a new chapter can be exciting—but it can also feel isolating at times. At **Turku University of Applied Sciences**, we believe that feeling like you belong is just as important as academic success. That's why we encourage students to actively connect with others, participate in student life, and explore the wider community in Turku.

Well-being and Mental Health Support

Adapting to a new country, culture, and way of life is a process that naturally comes with ups and downs. It's completely normal to experience moments of stress, uncertainty, or even loneliness as you settle into your new environment. At Turku UAS, we want to remind you: **you are not alone**—and support is available.

The Finnish winter can be long and dark, especially for those coming from sunnier climates. Short daylight hours and cold weather may affect your energy levels and mood. This is why it's especially important to:

Checkpoints

Before You Arrive in Finland

- ✓ Get valid health insurance that meets Migri requirements
- ✓ Apply for your residence permit (non-EU/EEA students) or register your EU right of residence
- ✓ Apply for accommodation (e.g. through TYS or other rental platforms)
- ✓ Book your trip to Turku or Salo
- ✓ Check the criminal record requirements (for Social Services students)
- ✓ Prepare the necessary documents (passport, acceptance letter, health/vaccine records, proof of finances, etc.)
- ✓ Apply for a D visa if eligible (optional but useful for faster travel)

After You Arrive in Finland

- ✓ Attend Orientation Days
- ✓ Visit DVV for registration and personal identity code (attend DVV POP-UP Days)
- ✓ Activate your Turku UAS student credentials (email, intranet, ItsLearning, Peppi)
- ✓ Complete the Digistart course
- ✓ Download the Tuudo app for your student card and university services
- ✓ Pay your FSHS healthcare fee (via Kela if needed)
- ✓ Get a Finnish phone number
- ✓ Open a Finnish bank account (bring all required documents)
- ✓ Apply for a Finnish ID card (optional but recommended for banking and official matters)

Settling In

- ✓ Visit the GLOBE Office if you need help in the early weeks
- ✓ Register your address in Finland and get a Finnish ID
- ✓ Join the Goin' App and student communities (TUO, ESN, etc.)
- ✓ Explore student discounts (transportation, food, museums, etc.)
- ✓ Contact MOI Services for support with studies, integration, or relocating with family

Take Care of Yourself

- ✓ Explore well-being support: study psychologist, social counsellor for student, and chaplain
- ✓ Know where to get mental health support (FSHS, MIELI, Turku Crisis Centre)
